At KES:

Born in 1894 he was fatherless. He came to KES in 1905 and his occupation was in the garden. When he left in 1909 he went to Hamptons and Co to be a warehouseman. By 1911 he was working as a "Hall boy" in a large house in Portman Square, London.

Date of Death: 15th September 1916

Place: England

Buried: Nottingham General Cemetery

Edward Francis Mott was amongst the "First Hundred thousand" who joined the colours on the outbreak of the war. He was in the Norfolk Regiment and was serving in the 8th Battalion when he was badly wounded at Carnoy on July 1st 1916, during the Battle of the Somme. After being some time in Rouen Hospital he was brought to Nottingham where he passed away in his 22nd year on September 10th. He was buried three days later with full military honours in Nottingham Cemetery. Mott was a fine lad, possessed of a fund of humour, and ever ready to do any voluntary work when with us. To his sorrowing mother and those who mourn his loss we tender our sympathy.
