At KES: He was fatherless. His father had been a farmer in Lincolnshire and so when he came to KES in 1895 his occupation was in the garden where he was described as very good. When he left in 1898 he became a banking clerk, working and living in London.

Date of Death: 25th September 1915

Place: Belgium

Buried: Ploegsteert Memorial

He volunteered into the 28th London Regiment and gained a Commission in the Lincolnshire Regiment on 23rd July 1915. He died in the area south of Ypres and has no known grave. Those men remembered on the memorial did not die in major battles but were killed in the course of the day-to-day trench warfare, which characterised this part of the line, or in small scale set engagements, usually carried out in support of major attacks taking place elsewhere.
