



## **Stanley Lovell DUBERY**

**Chatham Bn. RN Royal Marine Light Infantry**

### **At KES:**

The youngest of 8 children he came to KES in 1902 as an orphan. He worked in the Chaplain's Office and was satisfactory at clerical work. He left in 1905 and by 1911 he was a stenographer with the Gas, Light and Coke Co.

**Date of Death: 5<sup>th</sup> May 1915**

**Place: Turkey**

**Buried: Beach Cemetery, Anzac**

Stanley joined up in October 1914.

The eight month campaign in Gallipoli was fought by Commonwealth and French forces in an attempt to force Turkey out of the war, to relieve the deadlock of the Western Front in France and Belgium, and to open a supply route to Russia through the Dardanelles and the Black Sea.

The Allies landed on the peninsula on 25-26 April 1915; the 29th Division at Cape Helles in the south and the Australian and New Zealand Corps north of Gaba Tepe on the west coast, an area soon known as Anzac.

Stanley died of wounds in a field ambulance at Anzac Beachhead. He had scalp wounds and both his legs had been fractured.

..fell wounded near the Dardanelles, and died in hospital in Alexandria aged 24. Dubery's life, though short, was not spent in vain. After leaving School he took up Mission work in Herne Hill district, and at a memorial service in Denmark Place Church testimony was given to the great influence of his life. He voluntarily surrendered a good appointment to join the R.M.L.I. for the war. A real good fellow was Stanley Lovell Dubery and our heartfelt sympathy is with his brother and friends in their sad loss.
